Morning Drop-off



Just a few reminders when dropping off in front of the Rectory:

- 1.) Please stay in line. Do not go around other vehicles. Students may be getting out of cars in front of your vehicle.
- 2.) Please follow the traffic flow. Do not turn left and go out the main entrance.
- 3.) Please do not move the orange traffic cones.
- 4.) Please do not let your students exit your vehicle and cut through the parked cars. This is very dangerous due to limited visibility.
- 5.) Please turn right onto Dudley Road when exiting the lot to prevent traffic backups and delays.
- 6.) Please tell students to walk on the sidewalk all the way to school.

Just a few reminders when dropping off in front of the School:

- 1.) Please stay in line. Do not go around other vehicles. Students may be getting out of cars in front of your vehicle.
- 2.) Please maintain a speed of 5 mph or less.
- 3.) Please watch for students and adults crossing the driveway.
- 4.) Please tell students to exit your car on the right side (closest to the sidewalk).
- 5.) Please encourage your students to exit your vehicle if they are 8 or less cars away from the front of the line.
- 6.) Please tell students to walk on the sidewalk closest to the school.

Just a few reminders when dropping off on the side of the School:

- 1.) Maintain a speed of 5 mph or less while in the lot.
- 2.) Follow the traffic flow around the building.
- 3.) Please stay in line. Do not go around other vehicles. Students may be getting out of cars or buses in front of your vehicle.
- 4.) Please tell your students to exit your vehicle on the side closest to the school building.
- 5.) Please turn right onto Dudley Road when exiting the lot to prevent traffic backups and delays.

As my child is getting older, I am thinking it is the perfect time to talk to them about responsibility. Do you have any suggestions on how I can work with my child to help them learn what it means to be responsible?

Dear Ready for Responsibility,

Joan Didion once said that "the willingness to accept responsibility for one's own life is the source from which self-respect springs." Children who learn and understand responsibility tend to do better in school and life. There are many things you can do as a parent to teach your child about responsibility. Here are just a few tips to help you get started:

- **Be a model of responsibility.** Since children learn by example, the best way to teach them to be responsible is to show them what it looks like. Show your child what it means to follow through with commitments that you have made.
- **Create a chore list.** Take into consideration your child's age when you begin to assign them chores around the house. Make sure the tasks are age appropriate and even let your child choose some of the jobs they would like to do.
- **Praise your child when they demonstrate responsibility.** Make sure you have an appropriate balance between consequences and rewards. You want your child to learn what happens when they fail to complete homework assignments on time but you also want to honor chores or commitments that they have completed.
- **Make it easy to remember.** Children will not always remember to automatically do their chores. Use things like a calendar, bulletin board or chart that will remind your child what tasks they need to do for the day.
- **Be patient with your child during this process.** It takes 21 repetitions for an action to become a habit! Do not expect your child to learn responsibility over night. Children should learn what it means to be responsible gradually over time. If you are dedicated to the process, then your child will be successful in learning what it means to be responsible.

Journey- The Story Of The Carbon Cycle A Story By Mitchell Davey

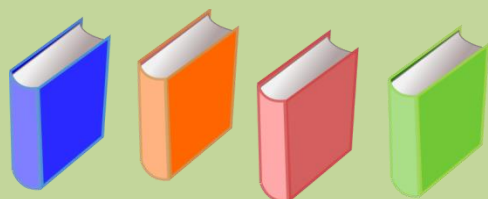
