There are so many valuable life skills that kids can be taught when they volunteer. Here are a few tips to help you introduce volunteering into your family:

- **Start at an early age.** If you start getting your child involved in volunteer opportunities while they are young (ages 10 and younger), you will create a lasting impression that will carry with them into adulthood.
- **Make it fun!** Students in middle school and junior high are required to meet a certain goal for community service hours. Some students might start to view this as a chore or something they are doing because they have to. Help your student find a volunteer opportunity that they will be engaged in and find fun. This will help to foster a positive attitude towards community service.
- **Try something new like "Voluntourism".** Instead of going on a traditional vacation, try spending your vacation time helping others. There are many opportunities out there for families who are interested in volunteering time on their vacation, both in the U.S. and abroad. USA Today has compiled a list of the ten best family volunteer vacations which includes things from helping at a theme park for children with serious illnesses to feeding animals at an animal sanctuary.

What's New in the Classroom?



Sixth Grade

In the fifth and sixth grade math class we have used Scratch to introduce some math concepts. Scratch is an online computer programming language. It provides a palette of commands the students may select to create their computer programs. The students use their Chromebooks to access and run their scratch programs. Scratch makes the math concepts intuitive and interesting.

In the fifth grade the students used Scratch to introduce the concept of adding fractions and decimals. The song Hot Cross Buns is made up of eighth notes, quarter notes and half notes. Each measure of the song gets four beats. This gave the students an opportunity to see how the addition of fractions and decimals is part of their daily lives.

In the sixth grade the students used Scratch to introduce the concept of inequalities. The students wrote a High - Low game. The game prompts the user for a number between 1 and 10. The program checks the number and lets the user know if their guess is too high, low or correct. Some of the students completed the challenge to modify the program to prompt the user for a number from -10 to 10. This was a fun game that required the students to use inequalities. The students enjoy using technology in the math classrooms to make the math concepts more interesting and intuitive.

Seventh Grade

For the past two weeks, seventh grade has been learning about endangered species. Students chose an endangered animal to research, then they created a Slides Presentation on Google and presented their findings to the class. Seventh graders learned about animals that had been unfamiliar to them; they also learned specific ways that can prevent the extinction of certain animal groups. The projects turned out well, and students enjoyed the project.

Mathematically, seventh grade continues to be earnestly engaged in solving equations, equations, and more equations, especially those that require multi-steps. Additionally, these competent mathematicians are exploring geometric concepts, specifically area.

In language arts, students are reading in groups tiered by gender. The boys are pursuing *The Boy in the Striped Pajamas*; girls are reading *I Have Lived a Thousand Years*. Each has a topic to research on the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum site which is an excellent source for understanding World War II and that tragic era known as the Holocaust.

Eighth Grade

The Everybody Counts program is offered at St. Pius X School each year and is such a valuable gift to our students. Each grade level learns about a different disability through speakers and demonstrations. Our goal is education and the development of Compassion and Empathy. Through this program, students realize that many people are dealing with difficulties that they may or may not be able to see, and that each of us is called to be the hands of Jesus to everyone we meet.

8th graders heard from a young woman suffering from Alopecia. Alopecia sufferers lose their hair, and the speaker shared how she was bullied throughout her school years. Our students were attentive and compassionate, and our follow-up discussion allowed us to focus on bullying - how that makes people feel and what we can do to prevent such behavior. Everybody Counts is a wonderful program, and we are blessed to have the opportunity to realize how we can become the hands of Christ to others throughout our lives.
